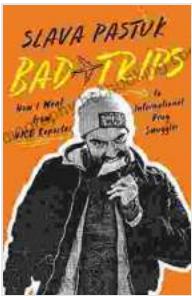


From Vice Reporter to International Drug Smuggler: The Incredible True Story

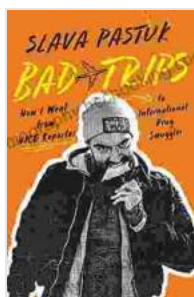
